1 INTRODUCTION

Within WP4 activities, it is foreseen to organise a series of Round Tables in Mexico, Colombia, Cuba and Costa Rica with selected stakeholders in order to strengthen the ICT dialogue and support the coordination of Latin America national policies on international ICT R&D cooperation with the EU.

A previous task is the identification and selection of key players to participate in the Round Tables in the respective countries. The following lists of ICT stakeholders by country represent the pre-selected participants to be invited to the forthcoming PRO-IDEAL PLUS Round Tables. Tentative lists of participants have been selected by Latin America local partners and include public authorities, researchers, academic community and private industry. Some of this information has been taken from the output of D.1.1 - List of stakeholders and EU/LAC initiatives on international cooperation and confirmed by the local partner. In order to involve the appropriate Round Tables participants, clear selection criteria have been applied, such as sufficient endorsement to ICT policy dialogue, contribution to ICT research, potential to foster LA-EU cooperation, industry leadership, and so on.

As agreed on the project kick-off meeting in Costa Rica, selected people, besides compiling with the selection criteria, had to be responsive and committed to an active participation in the Round Tables. Also it was agreed that invited persons should have been previously informed about the project and Round Tables main objectives. This has been taken into account by LA partners.

In some cases, whenever possible, ICT National Contact Points and members of other international initiatives such as EURALINET, IDEAL-IST, GISELA, UEMEXCyT, RedCLARA, NRENS like CUDI and RENATA have been included.

It is import to mention that contact information has been left out of this report due to privacy issues (this deliverable is labeled as public). This is the case for Mexico, Costa Rica, and Colombia.

3 CONCLUSIONS

The tentative lists of participants for Mexico, Colombia, Cuba and Costa Rica show the pre-selected key players to be invited to participate in the Round Tables. In total, 74 potential participants have been selected (28 in Colombia, 15 in Costa Rica, 17 in Cuba and 14 in Mexico). We consider as a reasonable number for a Round Table session the participation between 10 and a maximum of 15 persons.

The tentative lists of participants show some differences in the type of participants (academy, government and private sector) for each country. The majority of the Colombian pre-selected participants (20 of 28) come from universities, whereas in Costa Rica (8 of 15) the private sector represents the strongest participant group. In Mexico and Cuba the types of participants is more balanced. The effect of these differences on the outcomes of the roundtables has to be considered in the final analysis of the results.
