1. Section 1: Introduction

The University of Canterbury organized the EURASIAPAC workshop on February 18th at the Royal Society of New Zealand in Wellington. We strongly collaborated with the New Zealand Trade and Enterprise (NZTE), the New Zealand Information and Communication Technologies Group (NZICT), and the New Zealand Square Kilometer Array Industry Consortium (NZSKAIC). Together we decided to host a shared event since there was clear synergies between the framework of the EURASIAPAC project and the SKA objectives. The EURASIAPAC workshop could provide information about collaboration between NZ and EU and the SKA is an advanced project that builds upon such collaboration.

4. Promotion

The key to the promotion success lays in the usage of online media and established communication channels in New Zealand. We actively promoted the event through our professional network in and outside of New Zealand. Over 250 NZ ICT companies were specifically invited. In addition, we strongly collaborated with the New Zealand Trade and Enterprise (NZTE), the New Zealand Information and Communication Technologies Group (NZICT), and the New Zealand Square Kilometer Array Industry Consortium (NZSKAIC).. These organizations included the invitation to the workshop in their regular media channels. We also collaborated with the SKA event, which was held just the day before in Wellington. Many of the participants stayed on to our workshop and a dedicated SKA session later in the day.

5. Audience

We implemented a shared registration system and the registrations show that many visitors to the event decided to attend all sessions. In total, 75 people registered for the event and the predominately came from NZ (70). The workshop brought together academics and practitioners in the field of ICT. In addition, a considerable number of members of associations and government organizations joined the event.

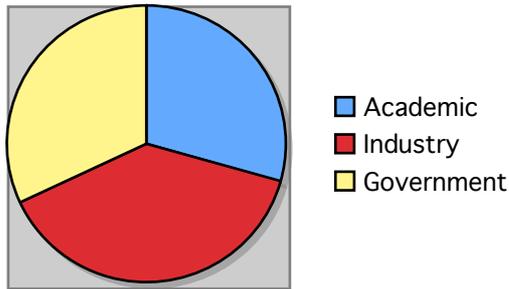


Figure 2: Distribution of participant across organization types

6. Event Outputs

Prue Williams, Chief Science Advisor International (MSI) gave an excellent overview of the NZ government strategies and programs that promote collaboration and the ambassador of Germany and Spain highlighted their national efforts for collaboration with NZ. The presentations from ACCESS4EU and FRENZ highlighted existing support structures that allow researchers to find partners and start the collaboration process.

Erich Prem and Christoph Bartneck presented empirical data about the ICT landscape to supplement the presented policies. Professor Mark Billingham and Dr. Burkhard Wuensche demonstrated successful case studies of international projects and shared hands on experiences with their processes.

July Watson (eResearch Advisor, Ministry of Research Science and Technology - MoRST) and Brett O'Riley (CEO NZICT) gave an introduction to the visions and policies of their organizations concerning ICT in New Zealand and their impact on the NZ economy. John Houlker provided an introduction to the SKA project and he highlighted the importance of this large-scale endeavor for the NZ ICT companies and universities.

After completing the dedicated SKA session, a shared social event was organized that allowed all participants to build personal connections and to discuss concrete issues in more detail.
