#### Dear colleagues

Welcome to the third PACE newsletter!

PACE is an EU-funded project looking at palliative care for older people in long term care facilities in six European countries. In this newsletter project manager Zeger De Groote gives an update on the PACE study progress. In our news section, we report on a successful European Association for Palliative Care (EAPC) Congress for the PACE consortium who secured several presentations and on the International Society of Nurses in Cancer Care (ISNCC)' document on palliative care models in nursing homes. We were also very proud that PACE partner Jagiellonian University (Poland) conference about improving palliative care in nursing homes in their country was a huge success. You can read more about this and other news, events and issues below.

The last half year has been a very busy, but positive period for the PACE project partners and consortium. We have made huge progress in terms of our studies and our expected impact.

First of all our main studies. For PACE **Study 1** (the large-scale cross-sectional study in 6 EU countries examining end-of-life care of deceased residents in care and nursing homes) the **main analyses will be published shortly**, so keep track of our website and twitter account. Articles on the use of quality-adjusted life year (QALY) in palliative care, on the protocol of study 1, and on palliative care development (application of a typology of implementation) can be found on our website. All research partners are eager to learn and publish on specific topics such as communication, quality of dying, quality of end-of-life care, knowledge, attitudes, cost-effectiveness... in care and nursing homes in Belgium, the Netherlands, Italy, Finland, Poland and the United Kingdom. We're looking forward to sharing these results with you.

The research partners have been collecting data for **Study 2** (a randomized controlled cluster trial in care and nursing homes comparing the health service 'Pace Steps to Success' with care as usual) and we hope to start **analyzing results** by the end of 2017.

We have also been working on reaching out to other researchers, professionals and policy-makers via the submission of abstracts, seminars and presentations at national and international conferences (2017 European Association for Palliative Care Congress, the 2017 Public Health Research Day of the European Commission). We are also proud to have been invited for plenary sessions at the European Union Geriatric Medicine Society congress (Nice, Sept 2017) and the Alzheimer Europe conference (Berlin, Oct 2017). Our Polish partner, the Jagiellonian University Medical College, organized an international conference in Krakow on 'End-of-life care for older people in long-term care facilities' at the end of March 2017 and attracted over 200 delegates to talk about improving palliative care in nursing homes in their country.

Last but not least, we have had multiple **research and management meetings** in order to keep track of our progress and to work towards our commons goals. In May 2017 we organized a <u>consortium meeting(link is external)</u> in Treviso (Italy) including a General Assembly and two Impact and Dissemination meetings. We invite you to find out more on this newsletter.

#### Purpose of the Workshop

The purpose of the International Expert Panel Workshop is to discuss the draft recommendations of the EAPC White Paper. The EAPC White paper draws upon the findings of the PACE project, two previous workshops and a scoping of the literature on implementation of interventions to improve palliative and end of life care in nursing homes, including identifying facilitators and barriers to change in different sociopolitical, cultural and economic environments.

#### Context for the Workshop

Two recent EAPC Taskforces, led by Professor Katherine Froggatt and colleagues, have provided an overview of the extent to which palliative care is provided for residents in Long Term Care Facilities (LTCF) in Europe. The most recent EAPC White Paper (2017) has mapped palliative care provision in LTCFs in 29 countries and demonstrates variability across these countries reflecting different health economies, organizational models and policy, regulatory, funding and legal contexts. Implementation of general palliative care in LTCFs similarly varies, and there is no agreed international guidance about best practice to implement general palliative care in this sector.

The development of an 'EAPC White Paper' will build upon the previous mapping work and current international evidence regarding palliative care provision in LTCFs including the outcomes of the European Commission funded project PACE (<a href="www.eupace.eu">www.eupace.eu</a>) in which the EAPC is a dissemination partner. Within the PACE project, extensive empirical data from six European countries and Switzerland have been collected during two studies: 1) an international analysis of deaths in LTCFs to determine quality of care and dying, and 2) a cluster randomised controlled trial of an intervention to support education and development of staff working in LTCFs to improve palliative and end of life care, called "PACE Steps to Success". A further review of the literature will be undertaken prior to this event to identify evidence for palliative care education and organisational development in LTCFs. Based on this range of evidence and through a consultative process, it is proposed to develop a framework of recommendations for policy makers, LTCF and palliative care organisations, which will offer guidance on core principles of palliative care and how to implement palliative care in these settings.

#### Aims of the Workshop

- 1) To discuss draft recommendations for EAPC White paper
- 2) Obtain guidance on which recommendations need further modification







#### Methods and Format of the Workshop

The Workshop will start with two presentations:

- 1. An overview of the PACE project methods and key findings
- 2. An introduction to the EAPC White Paper and rationale for the recommendations.

The draft recommendations will be discussed in three sessions with the recommendations briefly presented prior to each discussion. The focus of the workshop is on participation and drawing on the expertise and professional knowledge of everyone attending the workshop. Attendees will be seated at three round tables, with each table assigned two facilitators: one prompting discussion, the other note-taking to inform revisions to the White paper. Following the event, all facilitator's notes will be compiled into a list from which draft recommendations will be revised as necessary. These will then be sent to all attendees for their agreement and feedback.

- 2. Feedback on which recommendations need further modification
- 3. Identification of omissions of key issues







#### PACE

PACE is the acronym of a Collaborative research project financed by the European Commission (7th Framework Programme, Health 2013 Innovation, and Grant Agreement No: 603111). The full project name is: comparing the effectiveness of palliative care for older people in long-term care facilities in Europe. It started on February 1, 2014 and will run for five years. The PACE project is built on a consortium of 12 partners, consisting of 8 research institutes, spanning 6 European countries, and 4 European organizations responsible for impact and dissemination.

#### WHY

Societies in the EU are ageing, leading to the need not only to improve health by prevention but also to improve quality of life and enabling people to live and die well. Whilst many countries aim to enable people to live in their own homes, many older people will require long-

term institutional care at the end of life. Governments are struggling to provide high-quality long-term care for people with chronic advanced diseases and reduced functional and/or cognitive capacities in long-term care facilities. While a growing number of older people would benefit from a palliative care approach in long-term care facilities, palliative care has only recently begun to be developed in these settings.

#### AIM

The overall aim of the PACE project is to develop tools to assist practitioners and policy- and decision-makers to make evidence-based decisions regarding best palliative care practices in long-term care facilities in Europe. PACE will help to achieve the objectives of the European 2020 Strategy, specifically the European Innovation Partnership on Active and Healthy Ageing. Ultimately this will lead to optimizing the delivery of palliative care to the large proportion of EU citizens living and dying in old age.
